Self-interest

We need one another. When we set aside selfcenteredness "we are able to learn from each other, journey together, and be at the service of one another."

Division and Discord

We are challenged to suspend our judgments and ideologies in order to enter into dialogue that promotes mutual understanding and unity within our diversity.

Limited Expectations

We are invited to set aside our own expectations so that we can listen more clearly to what God desires of us.

Fear

"For God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control." (2 Tim 1-7) We are reminded that change is a necessary part of growth and fear inhibits growth.

Self-doubt

The participation of each person is essential for the synodal process to achieve its objective. You are called by virtue of your Baptism, to listen to the Holy Spirit in your life and to share your experience of God and His Church for the good of all His people.

Listening

We are called first to listen humbly. To listen in a manner that invites others to share authentically. To trust in the experience and wisdom of others.

Charity

We are also called to speak courageously and to share our experiences, our hopes, and our dreams with mercy and charity.

Seek God's will

We are called to seek God's will above our own. To discern God's desire for the Archdiocese of Newark.

Openness to the Holy Spirit

We are invited to embrace the action of the Holy Spirit, particularly in the ways in which the Spirit inspires us to embrace new ways of being Church.

Focus on others

"The Synodal Process is an opportunity to open up, to look around us, to see things from other points of view, and to move out in missionary outreach to the peripheries".





PREPARING FOR TRANSFORMATIVE CONVERSATIONS

We are invited to enter into a sacred space where we will grow in deep love and respect for one another. We can create this safe and sacred space by entering with a heart rooted in covenant.

COVENANT OF PRESENCE

When I enter into this sacred space with the aid of the Holy Spirit . . .

- I commit to being punctual and arriving on time.
- I understand that we begin each gathering with prayer because our entire dialogue flows from our communal prayer.
- I commit to participate fully.
- I will listen generously.

- > I will shift my thinking from certainty to curiosity.
- >> I will respond to others with open questions.
- I will welcome discomfort.
- I believe in possibilities.
- I have hope for a future which looks different from the present.

When I speak in this sacred space with the aid of the Holy Spirit ...

- I approach each conversation with an open heart, filled with compassion.
- I use respectful language.

- > I share at my own comfort level.
- I speak in the first person, using "I" rather than "we".

When we come together in this sacred space with the aid of the Holy Spirit . . .

- >> No one is anonymous.
- We sit in a circle to see one another.
- Cell phones and laptops do not enter the circle to distract us.
- We seek to slow down the tempo in order to hear God speaking to us.
- We always begin with a period of stillness allowing us to become fully present to one another.
- > We value the relationships we form in the community.

- We take turns sharing and we don't speak twice until everyone has had a chance to share.
- We seek to build trust so if a person shares their personal story, we don't discuss what has been said outside our group.
- > We take a pause between speakers and quiet is observed in order for an idea to be savored.
- We commit to action.

The eleven disciples went to Galilee, to the mountain to which Jesus had ordered them. When they saw him, they worshiped, but they doubted.

Then Jesus approached and said to them, "All power in heaven and on earth has been given to me.

Go, therefore, and make disciples of all nations,

baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you.

And behold, I am with you always, until the end of the age."





LISTEN

Select a passage from Scripture. Read it slowly and sit with the Word of God in silence for as long as you can. In the silence, notice the thoughts and feelings that begin to surface. Read the passage again and continue to sit with God's Word and to be attentive to the movement of the Holy Spirit within you.

- Matthew 28: 16-20 (Evangelization)
- Mark 2:13-17 (Discipleship)
- John 14:23-27 (Promise of the Spirit)
- John 17: 17-23 (Unity)

- 1 Corinthians 12: 4-11 (Gifts)
- Ephesians 4: 1-6 (Communion)

REFLECT

In what ways is God inviting me to allow this experience to transform me and to strengthen my relationship with Him and with the Church?

What do I need to leave behind in order to enter this process with an open heart, an open mind, and a willingness to share my experiences boldly and honestly?

In what ways do I hear God calling me to listen and embrace the thoughts, desires, struggles and hopes of others, especially those on the margins?

PRAY

God of Mercy, you call the Archdiocese of Newark to witness to our faith in Jesus Christ.

As we undertake the journey of pastoral conversion, endow us with your gifts of communion, courage and compassion.

Help us to fulfill the mission of Jesus and his Church through convincing outreach, vibrant parishes and effective ministries.

May we, the Church of Newark in Bergen, Essex, Hudson, and Union Counties,

AREAS OF MISSION FOCUS

<u>Pastoral Care of the Faithful</u>

HOW WILL WE CARE FOR ALL CATHOLICS IN OUR PARISH COMMUNITIES?

Where are we now? Where is God calling us to go? How will we get there together?

THINK ABOUT When you look at your own journey, you can probably think of times when someone at a parish brought you into a deeper relationship with the Lord. It may have been in preparation for sacraments, a liturgy that touched your heart, during a time of hardship, or a time of wondering about God and your life. Wherever people are in their life: joyful or sad, young or old, fully involved or on the margins or in need of healing, we want to be parish communities that provide encounters with the love of God and their sisters and brothers as part of their pastoral care for the people.



"So in Christ we, though many form one body, and each member belongs to all the others." - Romans 12:5

"The parish is where the Church lives. Parishes are communities of faith, of action, 10 (1) and of hope. They are where the Gospel is proclaimed and celebrated, where believers are formed and sent to renew the earth. Parishes are the home of the Christian community; they are the heart of our Church. Parishes are the place where God's people meet Jesus in word and sacrament and come in touch with the source of the Church's life." (Communities of Salt and Light, USCCB)

The parish initiates the Christian people into the ordinary expression of the liturgical life: it gathers them together in this celebration; it teaches Christ's saving doctrine; it practices the charity of the Lord in good works and brotherly love. (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1279)



The parish is "the normal environment where we learned to hear the Gospel, to know the Lord Jesus, to serve with gratuitousness, to pray in community, to share projects and initiatives, to feel part of God's holy people. (Pope Francis 10/29/24)

- create more vibrant and well-attended liturgies?
- provide resources and opportunities for Lifelong Faith Formation and Catholic education?
- provide opportunities and resources to engage in the pastoral care of youth and young adults?
- > ensure the availability and responsiveness of pastoral ministers (clergy, religious, laity) to the needs of the community and individuals?
- better provide for ministry and outreach for those in pain and on the margins of the community? (e.g., the poor, separated & divorced, living with mental illness, etc.)

Praying with Scripture - Developing a listening heart

Prayer can be understood as listening, dialogue, a relationship, and the gift of presence. Scripture is God's word addressed to us. It is a record of God's revelation to His people. It narrates the story of a people created in love whose lives have been redeemed by God. It is an invitation to draw closer to God and to share in His divine life.

In praying with Scripture, it is essential to hear God's word spoken to us today.

We are the new Israel—called, chosen and loved.

We are the early Christian community struggling to be faithful to the Gospel message.

We read the Scripture to find our story, so we can be attentive to God voice in our lives. Scripture invites us, challenges us and consoles us.

STEP 1 - Take time

- Let your spirit settle in stillness.
- · Remove yourself from distractions.
- · Be present to God.
- · Be conscious of God's loving presence.

STEP 2 - Read a passage of Scripture.

- Remember that God's Word is meant to be a dialogue
- Consider reading aloud to yourself or take turns in a small group.
- Giving your voice over to the Word of God is a powerful experience of entering into dialogue with God.

STEP 3 - Re-read the passage slowly

- · Pause when you sense God is speaking.
- Notice
 - when you experience God's presence and love.
 - when you are moved to express yourself.
 - when you are peaceful or lifted in spirit.
 - when you are disturbed or not at peace.

STEP 4 - Speak to God from your heart

 use whatever imagery, language, means or medium is most helpful to your expression.



When you have finished with a Scripture passage, it is important to ...

- Reflect on the insights and graces you have received, as well as your moments of consolation and desolation.
 - Where has the Lord spoken to you?
 - Where did you experience resistance to God's word?
 - Where did you experience peace and joy?
 - Where did you experience sadness and unrest?
 - How is the Lord calling you to grow personally?

- Be open to the word the Lord wishes to speak to you.
 - Let that word take root in your heart.
 - Savor it and let it unfold in your heart until you feel you have received all that you desire.
- > Return to those moments and remain there.
 - They are touchstone moments of grace that are meant to be recalled and honored.
 - The Lord often has more to say and more to give.
 Do not be in any hurry to move on or to cover too much.

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you; and behold, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." - Matthew 28:19

Thus the Church's mission is not an addition to that of Christ and the Holy Spirit, but is its sacrament: in her whole being and in all her members, the Church is sent to announce, bear witness, make present, and spread the mystery of the communion of the Holy Trinity. - A welcoming invitation to intentional discipleship of Jesus Christ, which includes engaging youth and young adults.
- A commitment to creating and maintaining a Catholic presence beyond parish boundaries.
- Training and support to help people share their faith.
- >> Outreach to the poor and marginalized that facilitates engagement with the community.
- > Intercultural sensitivity across cultural boundaries.

Long-term Sustainability

HOW WILL WE PROVIDE SUPPORT FOR PARISHES INTO THE FUTURE?

Where are we now? Where is God calling us to go? How will we get there together?

THINK ABOUT As you look back on your life, there are probably many ways in which you can see what a blessing your parish has been to you and your family. It is there that you received your sacraments, celebrated the joyous and sad times of your lives and grew in your faith. However, parishes have changed a lot over the years. Your experience of parish is most likely different from that of your parents and that of your children. We can see that we have less priests, smaller parish staffs, less resources, less people involved in ministry, and less people coming to Mass. Yet despite these realities God wants to assure us that He never leaves us and call us to stay on mission even as our parishes adapt and respond to the current times.



"The Church, in her doctrine, life and worship, perpetuates and transmits to every generation all that she herself is, all that she believes." (Dei Verbum, 8 #1)

A real sense of Church communion, the gift of the Spirit that urges our free and generous response, will bring forth as its precious fruit, in the "one and catholic" Church the continuing value of the rich variety of vocations and conditions of life, charisms, ministries, works, and responsibilities, as well as a more demonstrable and decisive collaboration of groups, associations and movements of the lay faithful . . .
